World rallies to save our Tuptim

SEVEN-month-old Tuptim Jadngooluem has been given a second chance at life after over US\$65,000 was raised in one week to cover the cost of her life-saving operation.

Tuptim was admitted to the intensive care unit (ICU) of Ramathibodi Hospital Bangkok last week, suffering from internal bleeding.

Doctors did not think she would see the new year.

The only daughter of Rattanachai "Kru Nai", a well known trainer at Tiger Muay Thai in Chalong, Tuptim was diagnosed with a terminal liver condition known as biliary obstruction when she was three months old.

The only option to save her life is a parental donor liver transplant - a complicated 18-hour surgery during which a portion of the parent's liver is removed and placed inside their child.

Mr Rattanachai, and Tuptim's

mother, "Khun Nit", were facing the dire prospect of their daughter dying as they were unable to afford the 1.5 million baht to pay for the operation.

The fund-raising campaign to save Tiptum captured the imagination of the world this week, culminating with Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC) President

Dana White agreeing to pay for the operation.

Mr White came across a plea for donations to save Tuptim on a Mixed Martial Arts forum and confirmed he would pay the US\$50,000 to cover the cost of the surgery.

The generosity of Mr White, coupled with the tireless efforts of the people at Tiger Muay Thai, now means Tuptim will get her operation on January 14.

It will be carried out by renowned Bangkok-based specialist, Dr Sumate Teeraratkul, who has an over 90 per cent success rate in performing the procedure.

Ms Nit is amazed by the number of people who have contributed to help save her daughter's life.

"I don't know how to thank everyone enough. Everyone has worked so hard to try and get money for Tuptim. I say thank you but I know in my heart that is not enough," she said.

Two dead, four injured in grenade blast

POLICE believe an explosion that killed two and injured four people in Rassada this week was caused by an M67 grenade.

Police arrived at the scene near Rassada Pier on Monday afternoon to find a man dead on a bench in front of a house on Soi Wanich 1.

The man, identified as Sutthi Saeung, 25, of Nakhon Sri Thammarat, suffered wounds to his chest.

His right hand was also blown off.

Police said that Mr Sutthi, a crewman on the *Chok Maneedech*, had shown the grenade to friends for fun when it slipped

out of his hand and exploded.

Mr Sutthi reportedly arrived at the scene drunk and continued to sit and drink beer in front of the house with a friend and three girls working in a nearby karaoke.

While he was drinking, he pulled out the M67 grenade to show the others and said that he bought it as a gift for the girls on the soi.

However, the grenade slipped out of Mr Sutthi's hand and as he tried to catch it, he only managed to grab the pin as it fell to the ground and detonated.

Mr Sutthi's friend, who remains uniden-

tified, later died at Vachira Phuket Hospital of wounds sustained in the explosion.

Four others were injured in the blast.

Sunee Pompetch, 36, from Nakhon Sawan suffered serious injuries to her left leg and torso.

Hansa Monkol, 21, sustained wounds all over her body.

Mr Kian Saepu, owner of a grocery shop next to the scene of the explosion, suffered wounds to his back while a 20-year-old woman identified only as "Patchree" suffered a hand injury.

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Scores turn out for PAD meet in Phuket

MORE than 1,000 people from throughout the South gathered in Phuket for the yellow-shirt People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) conference on Tuesday.

PAD Phuket coordinator Aparat Chartchutikumjorn confirmed that people had come from Krabi, Surat Thani, Phang Nga, Nakhon Sri Thammarat and as far as Bangkok and Phetchaboon to attend the conference.

Security for the gathering at the Royal Phuket City Hotel in Phuket Town was tighter than usual, with guards conducting a sweep of the ballroom and inspecting guests' vehicles on arrival.

The meeting was called to explain the PAD's stance on the territorial dispute between Thailand and Cambodia near Preah Vihear temple.

The PAD's position on the issue differs from that of the ruling Democrat government headed by PM Abhisit Vejjajiva, which has been a factor in waning yellow-

shirt support for the Democrats.

Heading the conference were PAD leaders Maj Gen Jamlong Srimuang, Pipop Thongchai and New Politics Party leader Somsak Kosaisook.

Media mogul and PAD founder Sondhi Limtongkul as well as PAD leader and Democrat MP Somkiat Pongpaiboon did not attend.

Mr Somsak said, "We have al-

ways received a good response from Phuket."

He explained to the *Gazette* that the conference in Phuket last night was just one of a series to be held nationwide.

"We will continue to inform the people across the country about this issue until we hold our protest [in Bangkok] on January 25," he added.

Internet yacht clearance closer

TRAVELERS entering Thailand via the new Chalong Marina will have the option of submitting official entrance and registration documents electronically, before reaching the port.

The Software Industry Promotion Agency (SIPA) is on schedule to complete the new registration system by February as construction on the complex continues.

Construction is expected to finish by September next year.

SIPA aims to streamline arrival procedures, most notably cutting down on the time spent filling out forms, explained SIPA project manager Pracha Asawateera.

"The Marine Department, Immigration Bureau, and Customs are all responsible for each yacht, crew and cargo check-in. Each department has a different form for visitors to fill in and the prob-

lem is that it takes so much time for them to complete all three," he said.

"We are developing a system to bring all of the forms into one single document. Nearly 40 per cent of the information is repetitive, so this will save time," Mr Pracha said.

The new system will allow incoming vessels to register with the Thai authorities via the internet.

The process will include a total of five steps: general entry declaration, importer information, crew list, passenger list and cargo information.

After submitting their information online, boats will be issued an "ID ticket" via email which will include an appointment time for owners, crew and passengers to report to the Chalong Marina in person.

The website URL has yet to be decided, Mr Pracha said.

He expects the system to be finished around the end of January or early February, after which a month-long testing phase will begin, followed by staff training.

"After the system is stable, we will be happy to conduct training seminars for tourists with program demonstrations," Mr Pracha added. **- Janpen Upatising**

Strong baht, not snow affecting tourism

THE heavy snowfalls that forced airports across Europe to close this week is only a short-term problem and will not dramatically affect Phuket tourism, say key local industry figures.

A more likely the culprit affecting Phuket tourism is the strong baht, they say.

Suchart Hirankanokkul, president of the Thai Hotels Association (Southern Chapter), told the *Gazette*, "I think the airport closures will not last long. The heavy snow in Europe may have a slight effect on hotels in Phuket as tourists may not cancel their bookings, but just check-in late due to the incident," said Mr Suchart.

"This is not as serious as the Iceland volcanic ash cloud [in April]. That had much a greater impact; flights stopped for weeks. I think this [the snowbound airports] will last only two or three days," he added.

Bangornrat Shinaprayoon, director of the TAT South Region 4 Office in Phuket Town, agreed.

"I do not think there will be a huge effect on tourism here. The flights are just delayed," she said.

However, Mr Suchart said, "The number of bookings from Europe [this year] is quite low.

European tourists have to pay more [to come to Thailand] because the economic situation in Europe is not good and the Thai baht is strong.

"Some tourists are booking for one week, instead of two weeks like they used to, causing an overall fall in the bookings [for December]," he explained

Dr Sirichai Silapa-archa, chairman of the Phuket Chamber of Commerce, had a brighter outlook on the current scenario.

"I think the airport closures in Europe is good news for us. I believe that once the airports reopen, more travelers will want to leave their home countries to escape the cold winter," he said.

Locals up in arms over Russian guides

ABOUT 100 local business operators massed at Provincial Hall on Monday to file yet another official complaint about Russians working illegally as tour guides.

The complaint also alleged that Russian guides were working as taxi drivers.

In Thailand, both professions are reserved for Thais.

The complaint, received by Vice Governor Nivit Aroonrat, listed four issues local operators said needed Provincial Hall attention.

Among them were a call to in-

vestigate companies hiring such guides, and to investigate alleged complicity by Phuket Tourism Business and Guide Registration Office Chief Piyasuda, who they alleged had close relations with such companies.

V/Gov Nivit said he would set up a meeting between the Guide Chief and the operators to resolve the matter.

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
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Patong overhauls one-way streets

CHANGES in Patong's traffic system moved a step closer this week when officials confirmed that new road markings and signs will soon be in place.

A map detailing the new one-way system was also released.

Five roads connecting Thaweewong Road (the beach road) and Rat-U-Thit 200 Pee Road are set to all become one-way, doing away with the current system, which has traffic switching to the right side of the road instead of the left.

All five roads are located between Prachanukhro Road at the south end of Patong and Phra Barami Road to the north, both of which will remain unchanged in the new system.

The project, which is hoped will help with Patong's chronic traffic woes, has been held up for months following disagreement on several minor points.

With most of the issues seemingly ironed out, Patong Municipality Chief Administrative Officer Phunsak Naksena told the *Gazette* he is hopeful the new one-way system will be operating by the middle of next month.

"Phuket Provincial Police will announce when the plan will be implemented. Traffic signs will be put up before it is expected to commence on January 15, but it first needs confirmation at a meeting about traffic management [to be held on December 23]," said Mr Phunsak.

There will be large billboards in both Thai and English around Patong to inform tourists about the new traffic system, and brochures in both languages including a map will be distributed.

The meeting to be held on Thursday was to put the finishing touches on plans for public parking areas on the Beach Road, with tuk tuk parking still the main concern.

Last week Kathu Traffic Division Inspector Jakkawat Buntawekulsawat said, "Tuk tuk management is our next plan. They will not be allowed to park in long lines like they have been doing. There will only be a few marked areas where tuk tuks are allowed to park".

Patong Mayor Pian Keesin said he was confident that 50 per cent of parking on the beach road will be reserved for public use.

"We will begin managing the parking area on Thaweewong Road first, then Rat-U-Thit 200 Pee Road, before extending it throughout Patong," he said.

There was a favorable reaction from Patong business owners at a meeting held earlier this month.

Arnut Lawlang, 36, representing vehicle rental companies on the beach road, said, "We agree with this plan, but we would like signs in Thai and English to clearly show which areas are for rental vehicles and which are for public use."



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Call to expand Street Festival

THE Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) says next year's Phuket Street Show Festival will have to take up all of Queen Sirikit Park in order to prevent a repeat of the congestion that occurred along Thalang Road during the inaugural event last weekend.

Bangornrat Shinaprayoon, director of the TAT South Region 4 office in Phuket Town, expressed surprise at the huge crowds. An estimated total of 20,000 people attended the event.

"We expected about 10,000 people to come, but we never sought any profit from it. The main objective was to draw people to Old Phuket Town, where local vendors would earn revenue by selling food and other products," she said.

The street performers were impressed by the crowds, said Director Bangornrat.

"The audiences had great interaction with the performers during shows and they were proud to show off their talents in Phuket because it is a world-famous tourist destination," she said.

Director Bangornrat named the acrobatics performances and an exhibition by Le Tennis as highlights of the festival.

"But I think the shows were all interesting and well received," she said.

One of the problems with the event was the narrowness of Thalang Road, Mrs Bangornrat added. "We couldn't predict how many people would attend, but it

turned out that there was a great deal of interest in these kinds of activities.

"Next year we will have to spread the event into Queen Sirikit Public Park to support all the visitors. But this year another event had already been booked at the park, which made the available area small and limited," she said.

"As for the other problems we encountered, such as setting up

zones for food sales and traffic control, we will need to hold discussions with the relevant agencies and Phuket City Municipality."

Next year we want the municipality to organize the event since it is in an area under their jurisdiction," she said.

The TAT would stay involved in a supportive role that would include promoting the festival, she said.

Bhuritt Maswongsa, the Patong Tourist Association's vice president for marketing, said the show was a good idea, but suggested that the organizers consider moving next year's festival to Suan Luang Park or Saphan Hin and doing away with fixed stages.

"Shows like this in Japan and Korea are normally held in parks, where people can stroll around at their leisure and form circles around the performers they want to watch.

"But at this event there were such big crowds that not everybody who wanted to watch could see the performers," he added.

THE Phuket Provincial Health Office joined forces with Rotary Clubs on Phuket for a mass free polio-vaccination campaign on Wednesday.

Red Cross Fair top prize house unveiled

THE Phuket Red Cross has revealed the 2.5-million-baht home that will be raffled off as top prize at its upcoming annual fund-raising fair – be held at Saphan Hin public park from December 30 to January 9.

The two-storey townhouse in Phanason Villa housing estate at Bor Rae in Wichit covers 21 square wah.

The three-bedroom home was donated by Bangkok-based real estate developer Phanason, which has built many residential projects in Phuket in recent years.

Tickets for all raffle prizes are 100 baht each.

If the grand prize is won by a foreigner – and as Thai law prohibits foreigners from directly owning land – it would be up to the foreigner to find a legal way to accept the prize or sell it on, a

Red Cross spokesman told the Gazette.

The winner will have until February 28 to legally accept the home, or the prize will have to be "returned" to the Red Cross.

There will not be a redraw to determine another winner, the spokesman said.

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Prisoner overload

IF THE rate of new inmates being incarcerated at Phuket Prison continues to rise, the island is going to need another prison, says the acting warden.

“The number of prisoners keeps rising, but the space at the prison remains the same,” acting prison chief Nopporn Rattanawai told the *Gazette*.

The long-overcrowded prison is already systematically moving inmates to prisons in other provinces to make space for incoming convicts.

“To help alleviate the problem, we transfer as many inmates as we can to prisons in other provinces, such as Trang and Phatthalung – that helps a lot,” he said.

However, it is the prison’s “revolving door” that is the main problem, said Mr Nopporn, who has watched inmates at Phuket Prison come and go for the past decade.

“Our actual capacity of 1,200 inmates leaves little space for pris-

oners to sleep, but we regularly have nearly 1,400 inmates when Immigration bring in illegal alien workers.

“They are always held at the prison for a few months before being released, then a new batch arrives,” he said.

section,” he said, but added there was no room to build more facilities at the six-rai prison.

The long-term prison population hovers around 1,250, he said. This includes more than 100 women, with most inmates being originally from other provinces and most jailed for not more than five years.

In general, more than half of all inmates are serving time for drug offences, he said.

There are in total more than 100 foreigners from a variety of countries, including the UK, Germany, Malaysia, Singapore, Cameroon, India and even the Bahamas – as well as Myanmar (Burma).

Most of the foreign inmates have been jailed for minor offences, such as illegally staying in the country or performing activities without the proper permits, said Mr Nopporn.

“Any person sentenced to more than 15 years in jail is moved to a bigger prison, such as in Bangkok and Nakhon Sri Thammarat,” he said.

Foreign prisoners are transferred to Bangkok, such as the well-known Klongprem Central Prison and Bang Kwang, where it is more convenient for embassy staff to visit them, Mr Nopporn added.

“We have to make a plan to give them a place to sleep,” he added.

Expanding the current facility in Phuket Town, built more than a century ago, is not an option, Mr Nopporn said.

“Some buildings have been extended, such as the women’s

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Is our tap water safe to drink?

THE heads of the two major waterworks agencies in Phuket say their water is safe to drink after it leaves the treatment plant, but experts warn otherwise.

Pisak Cholayut, manager of the Phuket Provincial Waterworks Authority (PPWA) that supplies water to parts of Wichit, Chalong, Rawai, Kata, Karon, Patong, Kathu, Koh Kaew and Phuket Town said:

"I can say that tap water from the PPWA is clean enough to drink because we check and analyze water quality every day. Sometimes after we have fixed mains water pipes, the water turns red. Just let the water flow for a while and it will become clear again.

"If you have problems about water turning red or want more information about your supply, please check where you get your supply from and contact that office directly, because so many people incorrectly presume that they get their water supply from us."

Sawong Sri-in, director of the Waterworks Department at Phuket City Municipality which supplies most of the city, said: "Phuket City Municipality buys tap water from the PPWA and we also produce some ourselves.

"I can say that generally our tap water is safe to drink. We check and analyze our water quality every day.

"But some mains water pipes

have been in use for a long time, and this might cause some sediment to be carried by the water passing through the pipes. This of course is after we have treated the water to potable standard."

Brad Kenny, an environmental engineer and managing director of Environmental Solutions & Protection on the bypass road, said he believes water from the plants meets international drinking-water standards.

However, he expressed concern about tap water becoming contaminated between the treatment

plant and the tap.

"I believe that as water leaves the water treatment plant it is potable, meeting international drinking water standards. Most water sources we have tested over the past 12 years in Phuket pass international drinking standards as far as physical and chemical analysis.

"However, like any tropical region of the world, bacteria is a concern and total bacteria counts are normally high," he said.

Specific bacteria tests normally performed are for E. coli and coliform, which are used as indicators for disease-causing bacteria, Mr Kenny explained.

"In our 10 years of testing water samples in and around Phuket, some samples have tested positive for coliform. Very few samples have ever tested positive for E. coli.

"These bacteria findings in source waters in the general Phuket area are not alarming and several very conventional technologies are effectively used to destroy all bacteria. Chlorine, ul-

traviolet light, ozone and several other methods are used around the world quite effectively to destroy bacteria," he added.

As for sediment occasionally turning water red, he said, "This is normal around the world and there is nothing alarming or unusual in Phuket."

Any contamination that does occur will most likely take place somewhere between the treatment plant and one's tap, he explained. "Once water leaves the water treatment plant, here in Phuket or in your home country, no one has total control of all of the places the water could become re-contaminated: the water mains, the plumbing in your house, apartment, hotel, and most of all your own water storage tank.

"This fact makes every location unique and the actual potability or quality of your water can vary from when it leaves the water treatment plant. "The only way to be sure is to test the water coming from your own tap. Home testing does not happen often because to test for all 33 items considered by many to be the 'International Drinking Water Standard' is expensive, costing around 14,000 baht per test.

"Testing for the three bacteria mentioned earlier costs around 3,000 baht," he said.

"The best way to ensure that the water at your home is drinking quality is to be sure your own supply pipes are in good order and of good quality, along with quarterly cleaning and disinfecting any water storage tanks you have."

"A final solution is to have a properly working filtration system installed at the point of use, like your kitchen sink, to remove all bacteria, cysts, viruses and other possible physical and chemical contaminants," said Mr Kenny.

"A good-quality reverse-osmosis (RO) system is the best choice. A small under-counter RO system will cost not much more than the comprehensive water testing, around 24,000 baht.

"Good quality RO systems also have several standard filter cartridges that will remove the typical by-products of chlorination, which is the standard way to destroy bacteria at the water treatment plants around Phuket," he added.

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
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Emergency rule lifted, but tough laws stay

THE Thai government bowed to international pressure and lifted the emergency decree in Bangkok on Wednesday, though the similarly draconian Internal Security Act (ISA) will now apply in its place.

Thailand had faced widespread criticism for continued enforcement of the emergency rule, which banned gatherings of more than five people and allowed security forces to detain suspects for 30 days without charge.

The decree also allowed the authorities to declare curfews and censor and ban publications.

Critics said it was used to harass government opponents.

The Center for Resolution of the Emer-

gency Situation (CRES), responsible for enforcing the decree, will be dissolved.

The measure was enforced in Bangkok and 23 other provinces in early April in response to mass demonstrations by anti-government "red shirt" protesters loyal to fugitive ex-premier Thaksin Shinawatra.

The 10-week protests saw the red shirts occupy large sections of Bangkok's central business district, demanding Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva dissolve parliament and hold elections.

The protests were brutally put down on May 19, with scores of deaths and the burning of key buildings in the capital and across the Northeast.

The emergency decree was gradually

lifted in provinces around the country as CRES deemed them free of unrest.

Minor bomb blasts, which had continued sporadically in Bangkok and neighboring provinces, were used to justify continued emergency rule there.

On Wednesday, the decree was finally lifted in Bangkok, Nonthaburi, Pathum Thani and Samut Prakan.

"The cabinet evaluated the current situation and found that the movement by protesters is more peaceful, lawful and largely symbolic," said government spokesman Supachai Jaisamut.

The move reportedly came at the insistence of Mr Abhisit, who wanted to restore Thailand's image overseas.

Nevertheless, the government will now use the ISA to ensure any unrest is quelled.

The ISA allows security forces to detain suspects for seven days without charge and gives them wide-ranging powers to deal with situations deemed a threat to national security.

The government will also reserve the right to reinstall the emergency decree at any time.

The lifting of the emergency rule signals a more conciliatory tone from the government in its dealings with the red shirts.

The government is in talks to help some 100 jailed red shirt protesters receive bail and legal assistance.

Cops nab 'Iranian mafioso'

A FORMER member of Iran's national karate team was among two suspected members of an alleged Iranian "mafia" rounded up by police on Tuesday.

Bangkok Crime Suppression Bureau cops arrested Majid Farsi, 37, after an Iranian businessman claimed Mr Majid tried to force him to pay protection money.

The victim, whose name has not been released, claimed Mr Majid told him he would be killed if he did not pay 24,000 baht.

Mr Majid faces charges including murder, extortion, armed robbery, rape and kidnap.

A second suspect, Hamid Resa Samani, 39, handed himself over to the cops later the same day.

Further investigation revealed Mr Majid was on bail for murder. The suspect had allegedly killed a man in the Sukhumvit area who refused to pay protection money.

Mr Majid claimed he did not know the victim and that a friend had recommended they meet because they were both Iranian. He denied the charges.

Bodies return home

Twenty-five Thais killed in Malaysia's 'worst ever' road accident

THE Thai government sent two Air Force transport planes to Malaysia Wednesday to recover the bodies of 25 Thais killed in a horrific bus accident on Monday.

The crash, in which 27 of 37 passengers died, has been described as the worst road accident in Malaysian history.

The accident happened when the bus smashed into a road divider and overturned into a ditch, MCOT reported.

The tourists were returning to Kuala Lumpur from a trip to the picturesque Cameron Highlands in Malaysia's Perak State.

At least 22 people were pronounced dead at the scene, while five succumbed at Raja Permaisuri hospital in nearby Ipoh City.

How do I become a marriage celebrant?

Crystal Riedemann, Wedding Services Manager at Laguna Phuket, replies:

Wedding celebrants are used to conduct weddings at Laguna Phuket's Chapel on the Lagoon and elsewhere in Phuket.

Our Wedding Chapel hosts legal or religious marriage ceremonies, but weddings conducted by celebrants are symbolic events.

We believe a celebrant is one of the most important elements in a marriage ceremony, and as such it is not a role to be taken lightly.

Becoming a marriage celebrant is not difficult, but it is not a job for the fainthearted.

Celebrants should have faith in the bonds of marriage and this must be conveyed to the couple through the manner of communication.

Although there are courses to be trained as a marriage celebrant, this is not a requirement.

The basic necessity is that a celebrant must have great public speaking talent and be able to make a nervous wedding couple laugh.

Since guests may be filming the happy moment, it's imperative that a celebrant has a voice that is clearly projected and allows everyone to be part of the proceedings.

Men tend to be more successful as celebrants, as a deep male voice lends credibility and a level of seriousness to the event. However, it should be noted that many cultures prefer a female celebrant.

A marriage celebrant should always be presentable and well dressed; after all, couples will be looking at him or her in their photo album for many years to come.

If you think you have the qualities required to be a wedding celebrant, visit your local resorts and present yourself to the events manager.

You will soon find out if you are right for the job, or if you're more suited to a different vocation.

Taveesak Pethsuwan, Chief Administrative Officer at Muang District Office, replies:

A man and woman can be married in Thailand without going to their local District Office in person.

To do so, they must first submit a completed Registration of Marriage Application form (KorRor1) with the local District Office at least three working days before the wedding.

The KorRor1 is available at any District Office.

Both the bride and groom must sign the form, which must have

Get involved to keep construction civil

FIRST PERSON

THERE are a lot of construction projects taking place around Phuket at the moment and people living in the construction “zones” often don’t know about them until work actually begins.

This is a problem because if they are badly affected by the project, they will voice their protest too late.

I urge local people to get more involved in the very first stages of local construction projects. They should pay more attention to what’s going on in their neighborhoods, voice more comments at public hearings and fill in questionnaires when asked.

I always hear that people ignore the questionnaires or refuse to comment and even though some attend the public hearings, they don’t pay much attention to the issues.

Arranging public hearings and distributing questionnaires are required with all environmental impact assessments (EIAs) and initial environmental examinations (IEEs).

For those living next to construction projects, if your property is damaged in the process you can ask for documents guaranteeing protection from damage at your local municipality or administrative organization where the EIA or IEE reports are kept.

You can use these documents to seek compensation from those responsible and you don’t need to file a complaint in court.

These documents also serve to

ensure construction companies are more careful and try not to damage the area around their projects.

If a project is to have a large impact on local people – for example a deep-sea marina or large hotel – I would like to see project owners and licensed firms publicize the plans well.

They should set several public hearings and place importance on the comments given by people living in the area. They should be sure to address any concerns with preventative measures.

For example, if a project is near the sea and locals say they need access to the beach, developers should provide a walkway for them. Developers should also keep records of all protests.

If both parties show sincere gestures – locals actively present their comments and concerns from the first steps of the project and developers willingly cooperate to find solutions – I am sure local lifestyles and development can go forward together without any problems.

signed photocopies of the couple’s passports or ID cards attached.

Anyone can submit the form at any District Office on behalf of the bride and groom.

A processing fee of 200 baht will be charged when the form is

filed at the District Office.

After the KorRor1 has been approved, the District Office will send one of its officers to witness the wedding ceremony.

After the ceremony, the bride and groom must complete the

Registration of Marriage form (KorRor2).

The KorRor2 must have signed photocopies of the passport or ID card of both the bride and groom attached.

Two different witnesses must sign the KorRor2 – not including the District Office witness.

Anyone can be a witness, but signed photocopies of the witness’ ID cards or passports must be attached to the KorRor2.

After the bride and groom and the witnesses have all signed the KorRor2, the officer attending the ceremony will then sign the form as a final witness.

Once the officer has signed the form, the couple are legally man and wife.

The bride and groom will then receive their Certificate of Marriage (KorRor3), which the officer attending the ceremony will sign as registrar and affix the official seal of the District Office.

This is why we need the KorRor1 to be submitted several days before the wedding ceremony takes place.

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Sound advice in time for Christmas

AS THE end of another year speeds towards us, I would like to wish all Phuket readers of Island Investor a very merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

On this theme it should be in everyone's interest to review one's financial health. Financial checkups are as important as medical checkups and should be conducted at least as regularly.

Here is a list of financial matters that should be considered going into the New Year.

• Build up your cash

What was once considered safe may not be now. With unemployment at very high levels throughout the world, many of us who thought our jobs were safe may need to reconsider. Be smart and start to build up your cash reserves just in case the axe falls.

• Bank safely

For a long time people trusted banks – all banks. That's not true anymore. More than 200 banks have gone broke since the financial crisis started in 2008. Look again at the bank that holds your hard-earned savings. How safe is it? How well run is it?

• Choose financial products carefully

Most investors should avoid transparency issues and the credit

risk and liquidity issues associated with most structured products and investments. Why invest if the product is overly complicated? A good rule to follow is: The simpler the investment, the better the investment.

• Avoid interest rates that are "too good to be true"

Be sure that your returns on cash are obtained without compromising security or liquidity. Banks that offer unusually high deposit rates are doing so for a reason – they are finding it difficult attracting deposits. Do you really want to trust your deposits to an institution that is struggling?

• Diversify and watch your investment portfolio

A key mistake many investors make is holding too many assets in one particular investment. This may be a legacy issue, such as holding a disproportionate amount of shares in the company you used to work for. Emotional attachments can be dangerous. Spread the risk of by diversifying your investment portfolio.

• Be aware of currencies

The baht has appreciated against most major currencies this year. Thailand's better fundamentals and the flow of foreign capital into the country has attracted in-


vestors to the national currency. This trend is likely to continue over the medium to long term, albeit with periods of weakness. You might not want to have all your income-generating assets in other currencies whilst your spending is in Thai baht.

• If you have a UK pension, make sure it can be transferred overseas

Many retirees in Phuket have UK pensions that have suffered considerably due to the strength of the baht. In addition, many UK pension schemes are "underwater" as they do not have enough assets to pay their current or future retirees. Are these schemes really safe if the former employer fails? A transfer to an overseas pension scheme such as a QROPS (Qualified Recognized Overseas Pension Scheme) should be considered.

• Make sure you are "non-domiciled" for tax purposes

As the UK struggles to get its finances in order, the desire to increase revenues from its expats is growing stronger. Inland Rev-

enue is increasingly checking whether an expat is really an expat. Do you have property in the UK? Do you hold memberships to golf clubs? Do you attend a regular annual event in the UK? Just because you spent less than 91 days in the UK each year is not enough these days to convince the authorities you are not subject to UK tax.

• Beware inheritance tax traps

Inheritance tax planning is a crucial but largely ignored issue for expats with substantial assets. For a surviving spouse or unmar-

ried UK national, all assets above UK£325,000 will be subject to 40% inheritance tax upon their own death. Using a trust can mitigate some if not all potential liabilities. Do you really want to hand over 40% of your hard earned wealth when you die? No, didn't think so.

Enjoy the festivities but make a resolution to take a look at your finances in the New Year.

Base wage rise 'won't spur inflation in Phuket'

PHUKET will not be affected by inflation following the cabinet's approval of a rise in the national minimum wage, according to local officials.

Phuket workers were given highest minimum wage in the country at 221 baht per day, following the cabinet's approval earlier this month.

The increase, to take effect from January 1, will no doubt be welcomed by low-income workers on the island, many of whom are migrants from Burma.

The move follows The Central Wage Committee's decision in September to increase Phuket's minimum wage from 204 baht to 214 baht.

Arwut Wongsavas, assistant head of the Phuket Commercial Office, says the rise will not affect the majority of low-income earners because most Phuket employers pay wages above the minimum rate.

"Prices in Phuket are higher than the

national average. Most years we also have a higher inflation rate than the rest of the country. This is because retail costs are high in Phuket, owing to high land prices and expensive rent. These extra costs push up retail prices", Mr Arwut said.

"This is why average wages in the province are quite high and independent of government intervention. I believe that the minimum wage increase will not have much of an effect on Phuket prices in general because it will not affect the majority of workers here," Mr Arwut added.

Despite rising oil prices, Phuket should be able to stave off inflation in the coming year, he said.

"Judging from previous oil price rises, Phuket's retail sector does not react significantly to changes in oil prices. When oil prices increase, retailers are reluctant to pass on the extra cost to consumers because it will reduce their

competitiveness. Government agencies also work with large suppliers to ensure market price stability for many commodities. External factors are unlikely to affect consumer prices straight away," he said.

It is expected that Phuket's inflation rate will come in at around 3.2% at the end of the year.

According to Mr Arwut, this is lower than the 3.5% that had been expected. An inflation rate above 3% is higher than the national average, but is still considered a desirable rate for the island's economy.

To offset inflationary pressures the Ministry of Commerce this year froze prices of several commodities, but the measure is set to expire at the end of this year.

By next year it is likely that prices of goods, such as chemical fertilizers, palm oil and agricultural crops will rise, according to reports from *The Nation*.

Push for more medi-tourists

DEVELOPMENT and promotion of southern Thailand as a medical tourism hub was the topic of an international conference this month at the Royal Phuket City Hotel.

IMT-GT (Indonesia-Malaysia-Thailand Growth Triangle) co-operative initiative officials participated in the "IMT-GT Medical Tourism" meeting chaired by Thailand's Ministry of Tourism and Sports Permanent Secretary Sombat Kurupan on December 15.

Among the 350 people in attendance were representatives from all three countries involved with tourism and medicine in both government and private sectors, including delegates from Bangkok Phuket Hospital, Phuket International Hospital and Vachira Phuket Hospital.

The conference was held to "discuss and brainstorm" strategies for promoting and developing

Thailand as a medical tourism destination.

Mr Sombat said, "With improving technology in medicine, the number of elderly people will increase, and the southern provinces - especially Phuket - are ideal locations to promote for medical tourism. While receiving treatment, tourists can also enjoy the natural environment, culture, food, nice weather and nightlife.

"These economic and local factors will help push Thailand to become a medical tourism hub in the near future."

He said that Thailand has potential to become a medical tourism hub because it offers "high-technology" medicine along with alternative options such as spa treatment or Thai massage at low costs. Added to the allure of Thailand as a medical tourism destination are its overall low cost of living and excellent services, he said.

There is an average of 1.45 million medical tourists each year in Thailand, which is expected to grow to 1.6 million for 2010, Mr Sombat said.

The increase in numbers is expected to generate about 60 billion

bah in revenue for 2010 and rise to 100 billion for 2015, he added.

The IMT-GT's proposals will be included in the National Tourism Development Plan 2012-2016 which will be delivered to the cabinet next week, Mr Sombat said.

Asian investors want a piece of Phuket

ASIAN investors from China, South Korea and Singapore still see Phuket as a strong market with growth opportunities, according to Phuket governor Tri Augkaradacha.

"Foreign investors showed particular interest in the island's public projects. At least three Chinese companies have proposed plans to build the island's light rail system. A Korean company has also entered talks with the local government to build the Patong tunnel," Gov Tri said.

Russian investment groups have also shown keen interest in Phuket's hospitality sector, with many investing significant amounts in Phuket hotels in the past year, he added.

"Recently a businessman from

Hong Kong approached me because he wanted to invest in Phuket's software industry. He said he was impressed with the investment potential Phuket has to offer, particularly in Kamala. He also wanted to promote the island to fellow investors in Hong Kong who work in retail, wholesale and real estate sectors," Gov Tri said.

Although Gov Tri said he welcomed foreign investment, he added that his foremost concern was to make sure investment and development would not lead to environmental degradation.

"Provincial government agencies will do their jobs to ensure that investment and development is carried out in line with the laws and regulations that we have in

place," Gov Tri added.

But he expressed concerns over the environmental impact assessment (EIA) procedures that have been set by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment.

Environmental impact assessments are carried out by central

agencies and take as long as six months to complete, according to current EIA procedures.

Gov Tri said the complexity of the procedures and the length of time it takes may prove to be a hindrance to foreign investment.

Abe hunched over the table, his skinny left arm wrapped around his plate as if he was afraid someone would try to steal his food. He shoveled the rice into his mouth and washed it down with gulps of water. When he was finished, he counted out 100 baht in coins from a plastic bottle he wore on a string around his neck and left them on the table.


MOVING ON

WITH Johnny Depp and Angelina Jolie heading an abundance of big Hollywood talent, *The Tourist* delivers a satisfying heist movie that makes decent – but not great – use of its stars.

Though it may not have the class of *The Thomas Crown Affair* or the charm of *Ocean's 11*, it's still a fun and sexy story of thievery that pays homage to Europe's most romantic cities.

In a role we're accustomed to seeing Jolie play, her character, Elise, opens the film as the subject of some elaborate surveillance efforts.

She walks with a purposeful stride and flaunts shiny designer clothing, often with a smirk on her face, hinting that she's always a step ahead of those tailing her.

Scotland Yard is keeping very close tabs on her, following her through the streets of Paris to a breakfast cafe, where she receives a message from a mysterious man.

He is known only as Alexander Pearce, and he is at the center a 750-million pound theft that both the cops and the mob aim to recover.

The message tells Elise to board a train to Venice and find

a man that matches his height and build.

She walks through the train cars seeking a target, giving a look no man could ignore until she comes across Frank (Depp), whose jaw almost hits the floor as his eyes meet hers.

He's a school teacher from Wisconsin, somewhat shy and reclusive, and definitely not used to dealing with high society – but he's the everyman that fits perfectly into Elise's unknown plan.

Elise makes quite an impression on Frank, so much that she has trouble getting rid of him after he's served her purpose.

Turns out the stubborn Frank, a lone tourist traveling around Europe, is willing to put forth a bit of effort to keep Elise in his travel plans.

This makes the film a lot of fun, not to mention realistic.

After all, ask any man: if Angelina Jolie randomly sat across from your table as you were sightseeing alone, how much effort would you put forth to keep her around?

Frank is obviously in over his head, but he's enamored, so he throws himself aimlessly into the criminal world.

Depp plays him with a signature innocence and disassociation, and Jolie gives the right touch as the enigmatic damsel behind it all.

Depp and Jolie are both part of the Hollywood elite that became superstars by adding a commanding screen presence and charisma to their good looks. Qualities that lend themselves

well to heist flicks.

Despite this and their individual performances, the chemistry between them in *The Tourist* always feels a bit constrained.

This shortcoming is not necessarily the fault of the actors. The screenplay just doesn't call for a lot of scenes in which Elise and Frank actually get to interact as they dodge bullets and steer speedboats through the canals of Venice.

It may be fun to watch, but ultimately, there's a void in the characters that will likely keep movie buffs from coming back for a second viewing.

Still, if you've got a date night coming up and you're looking for something light and fun, look no further. *The Tourist* is slated to hit SFX theaters this month.

Kids will be entertained, sure, but don't expect an adaptation that will engage their imaginations like the novels can.



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

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Serving green cuisine in Samkong

Cheap Eats

MUCH has been said in recent years about the mounting environmental problems facing Phuket, but despite all the talk it's hard to find many businesses that have taken clear-cut steps to reduce the amount of trash they produce.

This week's Cheap Eats column features a restaurant that only produces a wide range of delicious, low-cost dishes, but does so with minimal environmental impact.

The White Tent restaurant, on Hongyok-Uthit Road in the Samkong area of Phuket Town, operates a thriving business in an area where competition is fierce, to say the least.

In terms of dining opportunities, it is hard to think of a better place to live than Samkong, which is home to literally hundreds of excellent restaurants and food stalls with an unrivaled variety of delicious, low-cost dining options.

White Tent is easy for foreigners to miss because there is no English-language sign in front and its clientele is predominantly young Thais, many of whom converge on the restaurant's 28 tables at around dusk.

Also missing is the white canopy that covered much of the open air dining area when the restaurant opened seven years ago. To find White Tent, look for a row of motorbikes lined up along the road opposite Samkong Park.

White Tent is a nice enough place to dine, but many customers also take advantage of its takeaway service. The chefs can produce any meal on their extensive menu and will cook up just about

any Thai dish you desire.

More than enough for a family of three, my last meal there comprised four dishes: pork fried in garlic (40 baht), "New Orleans" style barbecued chicken wings (45 baht), *Tom Yum Kung* (60 baht) and *Yum Thalae* Seafood Salad with rice vermicelli (60 baht).

One nice thing about walking

out of White Tent with a takeaway order is knowing that almost all of the packaging is biodegradable.

With the exception of soups and drinks, most dishes are served in biodegradable boxes made from recycled paper that are lined with banana leaf – a far more appetizing sight than a polystyrene foam box. All the boxes are then placed in



biodegradable plastic bags.

Restaurant manager Thitaya "Kid" Hayeeyasin said that the packaging costs slightly more than packaging and foam, but not enough to drive up food prices.

"It can all be bought at the wet market on Ranong Road," she said.

She added that the boxes come in packs of 100 that sell for 200 baht,

while the banana leaf is sold for 15 baht per kilo. The biodegradable plastic bags sell in packs of 30 that sell for 28 baht each.

Given these prices, it is a shame there aren't more restaurants on the island following suit.


The pirate-powered musical production features several unsavory characters caught up in an

ANDY Andersen is the creator and Executive Director of the Phuket International Blues Rock Festival, a celebration of music taking place in February every year at the Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort & Spa.

He is the impresario directing operations for the festival. He is inspired by the music he presents and enthusiastic about the support he enjoys from the musicians, the crowds and the sponsors.

“With strong support from the Hilton, HotelTravel.com and the *Phuket Gazette*, we held our first festival in December 2005, featuring American Rich Harper and 60s Blues legend Victor Brox who played in the original stage production of *Jesus Christ Superstar*.

“The opening night of the event we had torrential rain and almost had to cancel the show. But we were able to move indoors at the last minute and had a good turnout. Now the festival is in February which is better for an outdoor event.”

Andy was born in Norway and spent the next 23 years there. After his first ride in an airplane as a boy, he wanted to become an airline pilot. But first he majored in English in school and developed his talents in music.

“I grew up in a musical family and started playing guitar at age seven. At age 12 I got a Fender Stratocaster and joined *The Saints*. I played in the

era of the Beatles and the Rolling Stones. In 1970 I joined the band *Gnom* on drums, where I had more talent, and we became quite a sensation with our 1950s show featuring music by Elvis Presley, Buddy Holly and Chuck Berry.”

Gnom were signed to a recording contract and produced two LPs. The band customized a bus and spent the summer of 1973 touring around Norway to enthusiastic audiences.

While playing music was exciting, Andy kept his mind on his goal of becoming an international airline pilot. He worked three jobs simultaneously in 1974 to save enough money for tuition for flight training.

The following year he enrolled in a major American pilot training school, at Vero Beach, Florida.

Andy spent 30 years in cockpits. He started as a flight instructor and worked his way up through the industry as a charter pilot, then commuter airlines and then his goal – United Airlines, where he spent more than 20

years. He retired in 2005, the year he produced the first Phuket International Blues Rock Festival.

“During my career with United, I flew Boeing 747s across the Pacific quite often – to Hong Kong, Tokyo, Beijing and Bangkok.


“I first came to Phuket in 1998 on a holiday and loved it and started returning three times a year. When I was getting close to retirement, I decided to design and build a home on the Laguna Phuket golf course.”

After the December 2004 tsunami, Andy decided to produce a positive music event to help Phuket in the recovery. He contacted Rich Harper and asked him to be the headliner.

“When I was based in Los Angeles for United, I walked into a club in Redondo Beach and had a phenomenal experience when I first heard Rich play. He is consistently held in high esteem in the music industry for his Blues artistry.”

For the 2011 International Blues Rock Festival, Andy has invited Curtis Salgado to headline the event. Curtis was ‘Male Performer of the Year’ at the annual American Blues Awards in Memphis.

“The Festival grows in numbers and spirit each year and is supported by local talent, who I always encourage to join our celebration of blues and rock.”

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Cult near its endgame

Mary Ann in Autumn

ARMISTEAD Maupin is a cult writer. In 1978, he published *Tales of the City*, interconnected stories refashioned into a novel from columns he wrote for the *San Francisco Chronicle*.

This was followed by *More Tales of the City*, *Further Tales of the City* and five other novels.

A loyal fan base has followed him everywhere.

The author identifies as a gay activist but refuses to allow his books to be pigeonholed as gay novels.

As, indeed, they are not. His gay characters are only a part of the swirling sexual mosaic that is San Francisco.

The first novel centered on Mary Ann Singleton from Cleveland, Ohio, who arrives in San Francisco and takes up residence at 28 Barbary Lane where a mixed group of gay, straight and bisexual young people are presided over by a marijuana-growing landlady named Mrs Anna Madrigal who, it turns out, had formerly been a husband and father to two sons.

San Francisco is the real hero of the novel, a mellow haven for the laid-back, eccentric and

trendy with Zen Buddhism, vegan culture and shops selling organic dog food.

The new novel in the series is called *Mary Ann in Autumn* (HarperCollins, London, 2010, 287pp).

Mary Ann, who had become a local TV talk show hostess, left her husband and daughter to pursue a TV career in New York.

She returns to San Francisco two decades later, at the age of 57, in flight from two personal disasters.

First she catches her husband having it off with Caliope, Mary Ann's own young, female "life coach" on Skype while he was away on business in Venice.

She then finds out she has uterine cancer and flees to San Francisco to see old friends.

Mrs Anna Madrigal is old and frail now, tended to by her roommate Jake Greenleaf who is a trans-man, a woman who has had a double mastectomy, passes

as a man and yearns for the final gender reassignment operation.

Jake's partner in a gardening business is Michael "Mouse" Tolliver who is Mary Ann's oldest and closest friend.

Heavy from the side-effects of the anti-HIV drugs he has been taking for a decade, Michael is the "husband" of the much younger Ben, a furniture maker.

A lesbian couple, two more old friends from previous novels, put Mary Ann onto a competent surgeon while Michael offers Mary Ann a place to stay and a comforting shoulder.

Another running plot is that of Mary Ann's abandoned daughter, Shawna, who has become a popular sex blogger.

She has left her possessive lesbian lover in New York and taken up with Otto the Clown in San Francisco.

She feels an uncanny attraction to a dying bag lady who is a

heroin addict nicknamed Princess Leia. There is indeed a connection.

Leia was abused as a child, sold by her parents to a pedophile named Norman who had once occupied the "pentshack" on 28 Barbary Lane.

Norman had fallen in love with the young Mary Ann but when she learned of his pedophilia, she pushed him off a cliff, but he didn't die.

He has come back now a gun and with the true story of Princess Leia.


Meanwhile, Norman had previously been introduced as the sad and lonely old man whom Ben befriends at the dog run of a local park.

It's clear to see that this is all rather fey in tone and Dickensian in plot, but the characters – for all their oddities – are sympathetic as they help each other through sickness and their approaching old age.

My custom is to dog-ear a page when I'm struck by a particularly funny or affecting quote.

I didn't dog-ear a single page of *Mary Ann in Autumn* but if the prose is not particularly elevated, the story is fast-paced and entertaining and worth a read.

Reading the entire series from 1978 would obviously gratify fans who can follow their favorite characters through three decades of momentous American social change.



Jim Algie on 'Bizarre Thailand's dark side

THE perfect Christmas gift if you're looking to put some sharp edge back on a holiday softened by all that tedious family warmth is *Bizarre Thailand, Tales of Crime, Sex and Black Magic* – a compilation of travel stories by Jim Algie written when he was honing features at *The Nation*.

If you've already been to Siriraj Hospital's chamber of horrors or on a cruise around Bangkok with the "body snatchers", you haven't experienced it through the eyes of Jim Algie.

He's smart and funny in a quirky but harmless way – in fact he's perhaps too respectful of his subject matter.

Even with Nen Aer, the monk defrocked for practising voodoo, who ended up in jail for trying to heal female devotees with his penis, is described as "not so bad".

Algie has tremendous fun visiting the dude ranch, and he's heartfelt in reporting the sex workers' troubles, but it's the genuinely bizarre that generates his best writing.

These chapters cover well-known ground in thoughtful new ways – amulets, the macaques of Lop Buri, Phuket's flesh-shredding Vegetarian Festival, Cobra Village, Tortoise Town and fighting fish.

If this is a compendium of stories updated, the closing chapter is fresh and full of promise for more and better. Perhaps because he's not writing for a newspaper or magazine, Jim is here more relaxed, more forceful, and more moving.

It's about a typical Thai funeral, if any funeral can be described as typical. The rites and practices will strike foreigners as weird, but of course the rest know better. Algie also offers something else: a reminder that in reincarnation, even if it's just people's faith in it, life goes on – for all its bizarreness.

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

Touch on track for green villas

WORK on the environmentally-friendly Phuket Touch Green Villas is on schedule for the planned soft opening in March 2011.

Work on the 300-million baht project began in April. When completed, the 24-rai complex near the beach in Nai Yang will feature 25 one-bedroom villas, 14 two-bedroom villas, a shopping arcade, swimming pool, spa, sauna, fitness center, game room, restaurant and bar, and tennis and squash courts.

Elaborating on their environmentally-friendly establishment, Phuket Touch Company General Manager Vithaya Nganthavee said the main aim of the project is to keep residents and guests in as much harmony with nature and the local community as possible.

Akin with Mother Earth, 70% of the total area comprises water surfaces. The developers have also been very careful not to cover any land surface with soil or rubble.

Instead, each villa is connected to the lobby with wooden bridges traversing the surrounding foliage.

"We've tried to maintain its natural condition by keeping every single tree and planting more local species, including mangrove plants," said Mr Vithaya.

Vehicles with engines will be prohibited inside the complex, though bicycles will be permitted, he said,

"Phuket Touch Green Villa's main advantage is the location. It's conveniently close to the airport, but also close enough to Nai Yang Beach to ensure peace and quiet."

Construction materials used on

Project contractors Tortrakul & Associates Consulting Engineer Ltd (TACE Ltd) will be responsible for construction of the project, which was designed by Consultant of Architecture Co Ltd. Landscape design is by Landscape Dreamwork Ltd, while interior design and decor falls to

Hybrid Design Co Ltd.


As the units are not for permanent sale, those interested in spending time at the Phuket Touch Green Villas will have the choice of a 15-year lease contract or a timeshare agreement designed to suit their needs.

Sizes vary from 90 square meters for the one-bedroom units, five of which have already been

snatched up at about 9.5 million baht each, to 140 sqm for the two-bedroom units that are offered at 13.5 million baht each.

All of the villas are fully-furnished, come with whirlpool baths and are decorated in a modern Thai design theme.

"We offer everything, our guests need only bring their suitcases," said Mr Vithaya.

The Absolute Twin Sands Resort and Spa on Tri Trang Beach





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Vijitt's design vision for life

DESIGNING a Phuket resort to integrate Thai history and culture with Western perceptions of what makes a luxurious holiday experience is a challenge the family owners of The Vijitt Resort Phuket took up five years ago.

Located on Rawai's Friendship Beach, the Khoopongsakorn family opened the resort in 2008. The careful planning and consultation for a full year before starting to build in 2006 is evident in the use of Thai materials and design of the 92 stand alone, luxury villas and the 44 rai of existing and planted native tropical trees and flora that surround them.

Bangkok architects Movida Co Ltd had never designed such a large-scale resort before but were selected for their creative use of local materials and their experience in interior and exterior design.

Named after Vijitt Khoopongsakorn, from a prominent Phuket Town business family, he founded the resort in 1975 on land he had owned since 1938, with 30 bungalows built from wood remaining

living

in the area. The reincarnated resort, now managed by his grandsons, maintains the founder's vision by using many locally sourced materials.

All 92 luxury villas reflect southern Thai architectural style. A large double bed in the center of the main room sits on polished cement inlaid with patterns set in local bamboo. An extremely high stud to the cedar tiled, or, alternatively, thatched, roof, and two sides of floor to ceiling windows generate an airiness that nicely offsets the darkness of the teak struts and beams.

Space abounds. Nice environmental touches are everywhere in the villas. In each bathroom a large, hardwood stand of "branches" encourages reuse of towels. Non chemical materials are used for cleaning. Water preservation is a priority.

The resort's landscaping generates an environment that encapsulates its tagline: "serenely secluded." Many comments on

Tripadvisor, favorably refer to the resort's natural tranquility. Here's one from a Scottish guest: "Friendly, yet quiet. Functional yet rustic. This collection of private houses around a set of central resources is the perfect getaway".

With 24 kinds of trees and numerous species of tropical fauna, including lemongrass lining the walkways, there is a veritable riot of nature that helps generate that type of comment. Circular designs sourced from local river stones decorate the numerous paths.

A 40-meter infinity pool along

the 250 meter Friendship Beach frontage is painted darker to maintain water temperature.

The nearby The Savoury restaurant and bars continue the Thai/Western design theme.

The signature Baan Vijitt Restaurant perhaps best captures the owner's vision. Once the family's weekend home, the Sino-Portuguese house retains some of its original roof tiles and the doors and window frames are also from the original building. Inside, the same polished cement floor emits its own history of a bygone era.

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Hot for Heliconas

Gardening

HELICONAS are expanding at a great rate, but not the plants themselves, though they are no slouches when it comes to hasty growth.

The expansion refers to the increase in new forms, linked to the discovery of new varieties by plant hunters, from its protean ability to change shape.

As a genus of about 100 to 200 species of flowering plants, the consequent development is that enthusiasts are kept busy by endless new cultivars.

The Heliconia has an array of colors, shapes and sizes, and is now so popular that it has its own organization, the Heliconia Society International.

It is a Top 20 must.

One of the reasons for its popularity is its durability and adaptability.

Widely used as a landscape plant, it also has huge commercial potential for the florist's trade.

One grower in northern Australia produces two tonnes of cut flowers every week, and since they keep well, they can be distributed all around the world.

Even driving around the small island of Phuket, there is evidence of how popular this plant is.

Used extensively as a border plant and especially to front garden walls, its less exotic forms are

useful for providing a rapid and colorful screen. The most common, *Heliconia Psittacorum* and *Heliconia Stricta*, have small, upright and brilliantly colored red and creamy-yellow bracts.

There is now one particularly vivid yellow-orange cultivar colloquially named "golden torch".

The cane-like stems, which sprout from underground rhizomes

or tubers, carry both the bracts and long, spathe-shaped leaves.

Somewhat reminiscent of canna lily foliage, these lush, bright-green leaves are one of the principal attractions of the plant.

Even when the Heliconia is not flowering, make good decorative additions.

The actual flowers are small white bits which carry the pollen in the middle of the dramatic bracts and are relatively insignificant.

The range of nicknames given to Heliconias include lobster claw, false bird of paradise – which is an indication of the exotic forms some of these plants can assume.

The "firebird" has huge, upright, bracts which are fleshy and bright-red.

In other cultivars such as *Heliconia Rostrata*, the "flowers" may be more than a foot long and hang heavily down in rich hues of yellows and reds.

One of the new cultivars, "sexy pink", is a most unusual combination of pink and greenish-blue; the parrot Heliconia has bright "plumage" resembling that of the bird.

Along with the increase in the showiness of cultivars has come an increase in their size and vigor. Many varieties can reach three meters, so care must be given to their position in the garden.

Remember too that all Heliconias are very thirsty plants, so they are best planted at the end of the rainy season when the soil is most saturated.

They will also need feeding at regular intervals and some protection from the tropical heat.

If the plant is in full sun, give it a protective mulch of bark or dead leaves. It is always better to position it in partial shade.

It is also a good idea to cut off excess leaves to stop it from losing too much moisture, and consequently dehydrating.

Heliconias are rhizotomes, meaning they have underground tubers and propagate, like canna lilies, spread beneath the soil and then produce new shoots which may be some distance from the main plant.

Granted this habit, they will eventually form large clumps which will need to be divided up.

Since the original heliconia will only survive for three or four years, this should be done as a matter of course after two or three seasons.

Divide and multiply.

Tip of the week

Garden jargon made easy

GARDENING books and horticulturalists often resort to technical language to describe plants and the processes associated with them. Such terms serve a very real purpose, since they offer a precise and concise description of botanical characteristics. Take the phrase "terminal raceme".

To put it into layman's terms, you would have to say something along the lines of "a hanging cluster of small flowers attached by their stalks to a central stem, produced at the end of branches".

While writers try to explain such terms or include them in a glossary, there is not always space to do so.

It is always helpful to give examples. If you refer to a "pinnate leaf" – which means a standard one constructed somewhat like a feather with veins arranged on each side of a central rib – your illustration might include cannas, dracaenas or heliconias.

When speaking of a "sport" in gardening, it is referring to an spontaneous mutation in the plant when breeding. The plant develops a new trait as a consequence. If that trait remains in plants grown either from its seed or a piece of the original plant, the new plant gets a name and is known as a sport. A sport will be identical to the parenting plant in every way except one.

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





FC Phuket gunning for glory

FC PHUKET took a giant stride toward promotion to Division 1 of the Thai League with a comprehensive 2-0 victory over Rayong FC at Surakul Stadium last Sunday.

The win moved Phuket two points clear of Rayong and means victory against Samut Prakan on Saturday will secure promotion.

Phuket supporters will be hoping their team can continue their excellent home form and clinch the three points they still need to go up a division.

Should Phuket draw with Samut Prakan, and Rayong defeat bottom-of-the-table Loei City in their final group game, it will go down to goal difference. Phuket is currently one better off in that department.

Phuket and Samut Prakan played out a scoreless draw earlier in the playoffs. Chainat FC remain a point clear of Phuket at the top of the group after defeating Loei City 3-1 in their latest fixture.

Phuket went into last weekend's playoff match with Rayong knowing only a victory would keep their hopes of promotion alive. They didn't disappoint, producing a thoroughly impressive performance.

Ivory Coast import Diarra Ali was the star of the show, netting a goal in each half to keep Phuket's promotion destiny in their own hands ahead of Saturday's final playoff game.

The game against Rayong proved surprisingly one sided with the Southern Sea Kirin on the front foot right from the first whistle. They should have won the game by a more comfortable margin.

Phuket created a number of glorious chances throughout the 90 minutes and could have had the game sewn up by half-time. Out-classed, Rayong could have no complaints in defeat.

Chances came and went for Phuket early in the game before the lively Thawin Butrasombat was chopped down in the penalty

on 24 minutes. Sure-footed Ali converted the resulting spot kick.

There was a bizarre scene at half-time when Rayong, who were wearing red jerseys in the first-half, emerged from their dressing room wearing a blue strip. Officials told the players to change back to their red kit so the second-half could begin.

The incident made little difference to action on the field as Phuket continued to pile on all the pressure in the second half, limiting their opponents to a couple of weak efforts from long distance. Ali fired his second goal midway through the half from close range, ensuring victory for Phuket.

Meanwhile, Phuket FC administrator Kazira Hans has confirmed star midfielder Camara Ahmed is set to leave hospital next week. Camara has been at Vachira Hospital Phuket since suffering a heart attack during a home match against Chainat in October.

On his condition Ms Hans said, "He (Camara) is getting better. He responds when we call his name and he is able to look at us. He can move his fingers and toes, but he still cannot move his body. Doctors feed him through a tube."
